Daniil Trifonov, whose "revelatory performances" (*The Guardian*) leave audiences breathless, performs an American classic. Gershwin's Piano Concerto in F is a spectacular showcase and an exhilarating mix of sinuous jazz, mournful blues, and a bit of Broadway bravura. The great American composer William Grant Still's mood-boosting, melodic Symphony No. 4 is a tribute to the optimism, energy, humor, and warmth of the American people. Anna Clyne's *This Moment* is a "meditative reflection on [Zen Master and peace activist] Thich Nhat Hanh's words 'The practice of peace and reconciliation is one of the most vital and artistic of human actions.'" The piece is also inspired by Japanese and Buddhist calligraphy.

Rachmaninoff Symphony No. 2

Rachmaninoff's favorite ensemble was The Philadelphia Orchestra; "the greatest orchestra in the world," he called it. In this concert, the Orchestra performs two of his most important pieces, including his last major work: Symphonic Dances. It was dedicated to The Philadelphia Orchestra, and the ensemble played its premiere in January 1941, just days before it performed the New York premiere at Carnegie Hall. His Second Symphony, a much earlier creation, was an enduring favorite that Rachmaninoff conducted with The Philadelphia Orchestra in 1909 and which received its US premiere at Carnegie Hall. The program opens with the brisk, propulsive excitement of Pulitzer Prize winner Jennifer Higdon's *Fanfare Ritmico*.

Brahms *A German Requiem*

From Mozart to Berlioz to Britten, great composers have poured their souls into settings of the requiem mass. Unique among them is Brahms's utterly beautiful *A German Requiem*, written after the death of his mother, with its emphasis not on the dead, but on those left behind; not on loss, but on the joy of remembrance. Cuban-Canadian composer Luis Ernesto Peña Laguna wrote *Oraison* in reaction to the COVID-19 pandemic. Sung in four languages, it ends on a note of joyful hope. This not-to-be-missed concert reunites Yannick and preeminent violinist Gil Shaham—always an exciting collaboration—in the world premiere of Mason Bates's Violin Concerto.

Big and bold, it's the perfect showcase for conductor Tugan Sokhiev, acclaimed for his "imposing, powerful" performances (*Chicago Classical Review*).

Beethoven’s genius illuminates these concerts. His final Piano Concerto, the “Emperor” is one of his noblest, from its bold opening movement through the hushed and haunting Adagio to the dazzling finale.
